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Cafeteria concerns lead to student forum

While the main meals cannot be kept out long for students that arrive late, director of Dining Services Sherri Gayman helps provide other kinds of meals.

"In our contract we are told to leave the main meals out from 11-1," Gayman said. "But from 1-4, we have the soup, salad bar, and cooked to order grill out."

For students that would like more than one serving of food, there is a limit as to how many they can receive.

"We prepare plenty of food based on our budget amount," Gayman said. "But we do have to limit the number of servings per each student so that there can be enough for everyone."

With the sandwich bar already brought back, Gayman is more than ready to hear feedback on other recommendations students have concerning the café.

Ineffective sprinkler system turns campus into water park

In increasing numbers students and faculty have found the walk across campus to be interrupted by an unexpected enemy: the Sterling College sprinkler system.

Due to poor design by SSI in 2003 the sprinklers hit the sidewalks seemingly as much as the grass, making walking from one side of the campus to the other without getting wet an impressive feat of athleticism.

Some students have found that the sprinkler issue causes more problems than simple inconvenience. Junior Melzora Towne was attacked by the sprinklers between Cooper and Kelsey, and causalities resulted.

"I had dodged one sprinkler that was already on and working, when out of no where, the sprinkler heads pops on," Towne said. "It was aimed at the sidewalk and the angle was such that it hit me in the face, and it actually really hurt since they're pressurized. It bruised my eye. But, more costly, the water also hit the back of my laptop."

While the laptop was not fully destroyed, the wireless adapter was hit, resulting in over sixty dollars worth of damage.

Fortunately, the Sterling College maintenance department recognizes the issue and is working to keep the water off the sidewalks.

"The plan to fix the sidewalk watering will hopefully begin this winter," grounds keeper Michael Kaffrey said. "The reason for most of the watering is because some of the sidewalks were not yet on the plans during design, and the wrong sprinkler heads have been used and lack the ability to adjust."

Though the problem as been clearly identified, fixing the sprinklers won't happen overnight.

"The solution to the problem will be to replace the old sprinkler heads with new ones that are fully adjustable," Kaffrey said.

Additionally, this will become less of an issue as the fall semester draws to close, as after the first freeze of the year, which should happen very soon, the sprinklers will be shut off.

"Sterling College works very hard to offer a clean, well groomed park-like setting for all students," Kaffrey said. "In the spring we will resume watering but on a normal schedule that I am working to make hassle free for students navigating their way to class."



"It really impacted me emotionally and challenged me intellectually," Ireland said. "I wanted to do something that would have some substance, that would be both nice to watch as well as make us all a little uncomfortable."

The content of the play is not suitable for young children, but Ireland said that the theme of death is countered by something much more powerful.

"I really hope everyone picks up on the theme of love as the sustaining force in our lives, that without it there is no Quality of Life," Ireland said.

This is Ireland's first time directing a full length production and said he was surprised by how many different thing must come together at once.

"One of the most challenging things about directing an entire play is trying to bring in all of the additional production values," Ireland said. "The set, lights, costumes, house personnel, techies, etc., all have to be organized and delegated."

Along with all of the production details that must be dealt with, Ireland said the cast's busy schedules and the limited time to rehearse was also a challenge.

"I know that there is a lot going on campus, but we started with less than a month anyway, so distractions were kind of bothersome," Ireland

After weeks of rehearsal, The Quality of Life will hit the stage tomorrow night at 8 p.m.

Following another victory by the women's soccer team, the men's team brought out as much power and finesse as they had left after a full


Each member of the team knew this would be the last game of the season and each ling College.
