The Warrior Track and Field team wrapped up the regular season with a solid showing at the 4th Annual KCAC Indoor Track and Field Championships on February 13 and 14 in Ahearn Field House on the campus of Kansas State University. Both men's and women's teams were successful and earned team honors, which were voted on by the KCAC track & field coaches.

The biggest highlight of the day, however, came as both programs were awarded with the inaugural KCAC Team of Character award. The KCAC Team of Character award was based off of the NAIA Champions of Character award and recognizes a school in each sport, as voted on by their peer coaches. The NAIA Champions of Character program was designed to remind athletes, coaches, and fans to act in relation to core values in all aspects of life. The Champions of Character core values are: integrity,

respect, responsibility, sportsmanship, and servant leadership.

Langford joins Hamburg Huskies

It's not every day that a Sterling College Athlete signs a professional contract. Dual-threat quarterback Reggie Langford (Sr.), one of the most successful athletes in Sterling College football history, will be the newest member of the group of individuals representing Sterling College in the professional sports world. Langford has accomplished an incredible amount during his career at Sterling. Langford's long list of accomplishments include a career record of 16-7 while at Sterling, leading the Warriors to the school's first ever conference championship last season with a record of 9-3, and earning second team all-KCAC for both seasons at quarterback for the warriors. This season, Langford threw all over opposing defenses, piling up 1,493 passing yards, as well as 795 on the ground. In his two seasons at Sterling, Langford was named KCAC Offensive Player of the Week three times. Langford was also a leader with a great work ethic, both on and off the field, which is something that can't be taught and is more valuable than the ability to throw a football.

Langford will be taking his talents to Hamburg, Germany, where he will be a member of the Hamburg Huskies. The Huskies are a member of the German Football League and are coming off of an 11-2-1 season and a North Division title, the club's greatest season in the history of Hamburg football. Langford is excited for the chance to continue his career overseas. "What I'm looking forward to most is just my opportunity to play with a group of guys that is so diverse. Some never having played football when they were younger, and some who have been to NFL Training Camps, or on NFL rosters. It's also a great opportunity to get to the next level, and to travel a little bit," said Langford. Langford is keeping his focus on what is really important in all of this. "I just want to go there and be the best possible leader and player that I can be. I don't want to worry too much about expectations, and I'll try to represent my family, friends, and Sterling College as well as I can. It also wouldn't be bad to bring home a German Bowl Championship!" Langford hopes to continue his success on another continent, but will always be supported by the Warriors here in Sterling, Kansas.
