

PARK PRESBYTERIAN GRANT APPLICATION

To be eligible for a Park Presbyterian Grant, applicants must:

- ✓ Be a member of the Presbyterian Church (USA);
- ✓ Be preparing to enter Park University or one of the five Presbyterian related colleges in the Synod of Mid-America (College of the Ozarks, Lindenwood, Missouri Valley, Sterling or Westminster);
- ✓ Take the SAT/ACT exam no later than February of their senior year in high school;
- ✓ Apply for financial aid by completing a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by April 1;
- ✓ Submit academic transcripts (high school and/or college) by April 20;
- ✓ Have a letter submitted by your Pastor (or Clerk of Session, or Director of Christian Education, if the pastor is your parent or this position is currently vacant).
