

One week after completing my student teaching I married John Behrendt and we moved to Minneapolis, Minnesota where John was enrolled at the University of Minnesota Law School.




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
SAM CHAO

Samuel H. Chao was born in China, but raised in Japan, where he became a born-again Christian. His family immigrated to the US in his high school days and after graduating Sterling College in 1968, he studied at Westminster Theological Seminary (MDiv) and PRINCETON University graduate studies (in Sinology) as well as PRINCETON Theological Seminary (ThM in Missions) before teaching University in Taiwan for five years 1975-1980). He received his PhD in missions from Fuller Seminary in 1988. He married Lorna Chung in 1978. They have three children Christine, David and EMILY. He was a pastor for more than 10 years in the 1980s and early 1990s, and taught Chinese history, philosophy and Christian missions at Pepperdine University 1993-2004. He is has been the president of CHINA MINISTRIES, PASADENA, CA, since 2004.

He and his wife, Lorna are missionaries with China Ministries International, based in Pasadena, CA. They minister in China among the House Churches, which are persecuted by the Chinese government—such as they forbid them to meet and worship, arrested pastors and believers who refuse to stop meeting, confiscating the offering money from churches, required the church to sing Communist national anthem before worship, raising the Red flag etc.

SAM has preached and taught at underground churches, seminaries throughout China since 2005. They go into China 4–5 times a year, for about 3-4 weeks each trip. SAM was arrested by the police once in 2006, for doing religious work and released after a 12 hour interrogation in SHANDONG province. He has been free from arrest because he is fearless and protected by God.




RICHARD ELLIS


As a former student of the SC class of 1968, I ---

I became an elementary principal and athletic director the last 12 years before I retired in 2006. (I did teach drivers education until I reached the age of 70)!!



I married a Moscow KS girl, Linda, and have three adult children and five grandchildren.


I'm still living at Moscow, KS. We do a lot of traveling and golfing.





Dear Sterling Classmates,




I was a full-time student at Sterling for two years and then decided to get married. We then had our first child (a boy).

In 1977 I had a sports related injury to my lower back and have had chronic back issues since. Though not such as to prevent working I have not participated in sports.






I was a member of the class of 1968 for only a semester, so I don't know how many people will remember me. But here we go.




After graduating from Princeton Seminary, Terry helped organize a new house-church congregation in Kansas City for 5 denominations from 1972-76.



I remember the 1968 graduation procession being led onto the football field by chemistry professor Crosen, Ph. D. as the musicians played the Grand March. I had a few tears when I wondered if I would ever see many of our class again. That summer, I again worked at Forest Home Christian Conference Center in California which is a mile high at the foot of Mount San Bernardino. Forest Home was where previously Billy Graham made the decision to go into evangelism. This experience had a lifelong impact upon my life as an avocation.



When I was a senior at Sterling College, I read about the terrible World War II death camps of Adolph Hitler, and I asked God that I would someday be able to know someone who had survived one of those concentration camps. After I graduated from Sterling College, I worked 12 years as a research technician at the VA Hospital in Oklahoma City. After I had worked three years for a professor at the University of Oklahoma at that hospital, I found out that this man was a survivor of the largest extermination camp of Hitler called Dachau Concentration Camp from his age 12 through 14 ½ when the American soldiers set the captives free.

I also marketed life and health insurance products for 42 years (continued on pg. 61).
